Letter from the Director

I would like to start with a thank you. By reading this you are showing your support for the Mineral King Preservation Society and the work we are doing. We wouldn't be where we are today without the support of so many of you, both financially and with your time. We have spent the last two years laying a strong foundation for our organization. What does that mean? We have created core documents, like our Collection Policy, Code of Ethics, and our Fundraising and Communications Plan. We are in the third year of the 5-year Strategic Plan that we revisit and use as a guide when looking at projects and programming. All of this planning and work give us the foundation and direction we need to be a successful non-profit.

We are entering a new phase though, one where we can begin to see the benefits of this planning. I am incredibly excited for what 2022 has in store for MKPS! We will be working with local tribal members of the Wuksachi and Tule River tribes and the Three Rivers Historical Museum to completely redo the Native American exhibit in the Mineral King Room. MKPS has received a grant for \$20,000 from Cal Humanities and we are providing matching funds from our Mineral King Room fund for this project. Sandi is also working hard on exhibit upgrades in the Mineral King Room to the geology and Disney exhibits. Her Curator's Corner report shares those exciting details.

I am also looking forward to launching our oral history project, but we need your help. You have the stories to tell! If you are interested in sharing a Mineral King story please reach out to me to schedule a time this spring or summer. We can meet in person in Mineral King, at our office, around the Valley, or via Zoom. It can be a more general family history, a tale of a specific event, a harrowing journey along the road, and more. The stories don't have to be specific to only Mineral King, but our mountain communities in general. It is so important that we document these tales and preserve them for future generations.

I am looking forward to 2022 with big plans, a lot of hope, and an immeasurable amount of appreciation for all of you.

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KNP Complex Fire

It was an incredibly stressful few months as we watched and waited while the KNP Complex Fire burned in Sequoia National Park. We wanted to extend our heartfelt appreciation for those that worked so tirelessly to protect Mineral King, the Park, and surrounding forest.

We also want to thank the volunteers that helped us evacuate our collection from our office and artifacts from both our collection and the Three Rivers Historical Museum. Everything has been returned and put back together, and we are grateful to everyone that helped protect our community.

Curator's Corner

Why do people visit museums? Findings indicate that what visitors discover once they are in the museum is more important to their satisfaction with the visit than their expectations or motivations for going in the first place. This suggests that the things that museum visitors value from their experience are derived less from what they expected and more from what they encountered and learned. In the coming year, the Mineral King Room will be focused on making the museum's collection more interactive and visually stimulating (to create excitement), more informative (to promote learning), and more accessible (including online tours for those who cannot see our collections in person).

As I mentioned in the previous Chronicle, "Plans are in the works to revive the Disney era exhibit in the Mineral King Room". We now have a team in place for the project; Greg Glascow and Kathryn Mayer, writers and journalists from Colorado, are working on a book about Disney's Mineral King project. They will join Amie Rangel, COS Art Gallery Director, and students that will be enrolled in the spring Art 112 Gallery Intermediate Exhibition Class, Lisa Monteiro, Director MKPS, and of course yours truly. The ideas are flowing and exciting, I can't wait to update you soon.

I am moving forward with a similar upgrade to our Cabin Exhibit. Our exhibit goal is to tell a story that helps the visitor better understand our cabin history, create a space that will allow interaction, and have exhibits that will attract kids and promote learning.

We are working with Laile Di Silvestro, M.A., RPA, and Historical Archaeologist to help tell the Cabin histories and plan changes to the current exhibit. I think our plan will please everyone and add a bit of interaction with the past.

And finally, for 2022, we will be upgrading the Native American Exhibit that resides in the Mineral King Room, which is owned by the Three Rivers Historical Museum. We have a team put together which we will be talking more about in our next newsletter. This upgrade is very exciting. Lisa and I will act more as facilitators while our Native American community will determine the story that is told, and experts in museum exhibits will determine the exhibit structure.

I am still looking for Mineral King artifacts for our exhibits. Should you have any artifacts from this area that you think might interest our visitors, please feel free to visit us at our offices in Three Rivers or call us to set up a meeting. I know sometimes it's hard to part with historical artifacts, but we can take your artifacts on 'loan' if you don't want to donate them permanently to Mineral King Preservation Society. This alternative allows so many others to enjoy what you have preserved while you keep ownership of the artifact.

Tale from the KNP complex Fire

This month, in place of a cabin profile, we are sharing a story from two of our members that evacuated from Mineral King during the KNP Complex Fire.

We received this in the mail from Kay and Chris Ogden with their membership renewal this year and knew we had to share it with our readers.

"On Sunday, Sept. 12, we hiked to the second Mosquito Lake, taking our time to enjoy the scenery as we ate our lunch. On our return hike we noticed some smoke creeping into the valley and assumed it was coming up from a faraway fire. There were only a couple of cars in the trailhead parking lot which was odd. Driving down from the parking lot, we spotted a huge scary plume of fire in the northwest. Stopped at the ranger station and there was a handwritten note: Voluntary Evacuation. Driving further we stopped at Ranger Mary Cochran's cabin and talked to her about the fire. It was sad to have to cut our annual weeklong stay in MK, but decided that it would be best to voluntarily evacuate.

Back at the Woodshed, we quickly began to gather our belongings and then we got a phone call from cabin owner, Glenn Cunningham, telling us the evacuation had been designated as mandatory. It took us until 7 PM to complete our packing and the cabin closing as best we could, before we began to drive down the mountain.

The smoke was getting quite thick, and day had turned to night. Although we had driven up and down that road many times, we had only driven it in daylight. This would be a new and different and quite intense driving experience navigating ruts, potholes, and tight curves under a cloak of darkness. As we passed through Silver City, the black smoke weighed heavily above us. We saw all the lights on at the store/restaurant, and the owners/employees were busy packing up. The party lights above the deck cast an eerie, surreal glow on the surrounding forest.

In Cabin Cove we passed a sheriff's pickup truck with all its red, yellow and blue flashing lights on, and we assumed the sheriff was making sure all folks there were aware of the evacuation mandate.

As we approached Atwell Mill, the smoke seemed like a heavy blanket and ash was falling which we could see in our headlights. Also, there were many bugs and birds flitting and flying around, perhaps drawn to our lights or disturbed and confused in the smoke. Below Atwell Mill, we encountered several Park Rangers in pickup trucks coming up the road. They pulled aside to let us pass by, and every other law enforcement and ranger truck did the same for us as we made our way downhill. We felt like they were making sure we could get to the bottom of the hill as quickly and safely as possible. A small kindness and much appreciated.

Once we passed the ranger house/public restroom we could see an orange glow in some areas above the ridge. Past the bridge we caught sight of a fire high up in the hills across from Three Rivers. We knew this was serious and needed to get out of the way.

At 8:45 PM (Normally, we are able to drive this road in 90 minutes, but under these stressful conditions it took us much longer.) we finally reached the end of the MK Rd., drove through Three Rivers and settled into a room at the Visalia Hampton Inn at 10 PM. We were exhausted and hadn't eaten since our lunch stop at Mosquito Lake that afternoon. Luckily, we had our cooler with some leftovers inside, and we dined in fine style in our hotel room. We did, indeed sleep well that night!"

Honoring Louise Jackson

On November 8th we presented a beautiful oil painting by Jana Botkin to honor the work Louise Jackson has done to preserve and promote the history of Mineral King and beyond. This was in partnership with the Mineral King District Association. We are all so thankful to know Louise and wanted to honor her for the impact she has made on our organizations. MKDA President John Crowe, artist Jana Botkin, and myself met at the MKPS office to surprise her. It was a lovely morning honoring an incredible woman.
